



I'll be honest, I don't really water hunt often at all. I have a time or two through the years, just not my thing. I realize I forgo some really nice finds by excluding this venue from my detecting menu but hey I'm fine with that. I love water but I'd rather just use my pool and I've been told I can't dig in the sand below the liner...ugh...whatever. As a result, I haven't been detecting as much this summer. Crops got in early this year and it has just been too hot and dry for me to want to door knock for permissions on people's already stressed yards.

So I've had more time to do other things during the summer "boil" this year. Some of those are sorting my finds, cleaning finds, researching sites for the fall, etc. etc. One of the things I've done more of this summer than probably ever is sit back and watch detecting videos on the good old Tele-Vision.

The reason I'm bringing this up is that I've really dialed in on how these "internet influencers" portray the hobby. I know I've ranted on this a bit in the past. But I've tried ("tried") to be more open minded and objective as of late, I swear (pinky style, not cussing).

I've noticed some things both good and bad but both revolve around the same premise...knowledge.

Today humanity faces a bit of a conundrum, we now have at our fingers more access to knowledge than every before, at the same time no real good way to force accountability on or test the accuracy of said knowledge, that's the rub. I'm actually glad, and feel blessed I grew up when I did and got into this hobby at age 15 almost 40 years ago now. It was a simpler time we listened to our elders and also, there was a bit of trust in experience. For example, if you knew someone was a car mechanic for 30 years, they probably knew a thing or two about adjusting the timing of a Chevy 350. Today, I feel not so much of what people entitles them to think they "know everything" is based on bad examples, bad mentors and faulty logic.

- **1.)** VDI (Visual Display Indicators) are the automatic go to in deciding to dig or not dig a target...or for that matter, what it will be when you dig. Some people believe that VDI numbers are today's magic 8-ball in detecting technology. They ARE a great addition to the toolbox on a machine I'll give you that. But relying solely on VDI is like voting for a political candidate based on how many babies they can kiss on a given day.
